Paint, Pizza & Connection

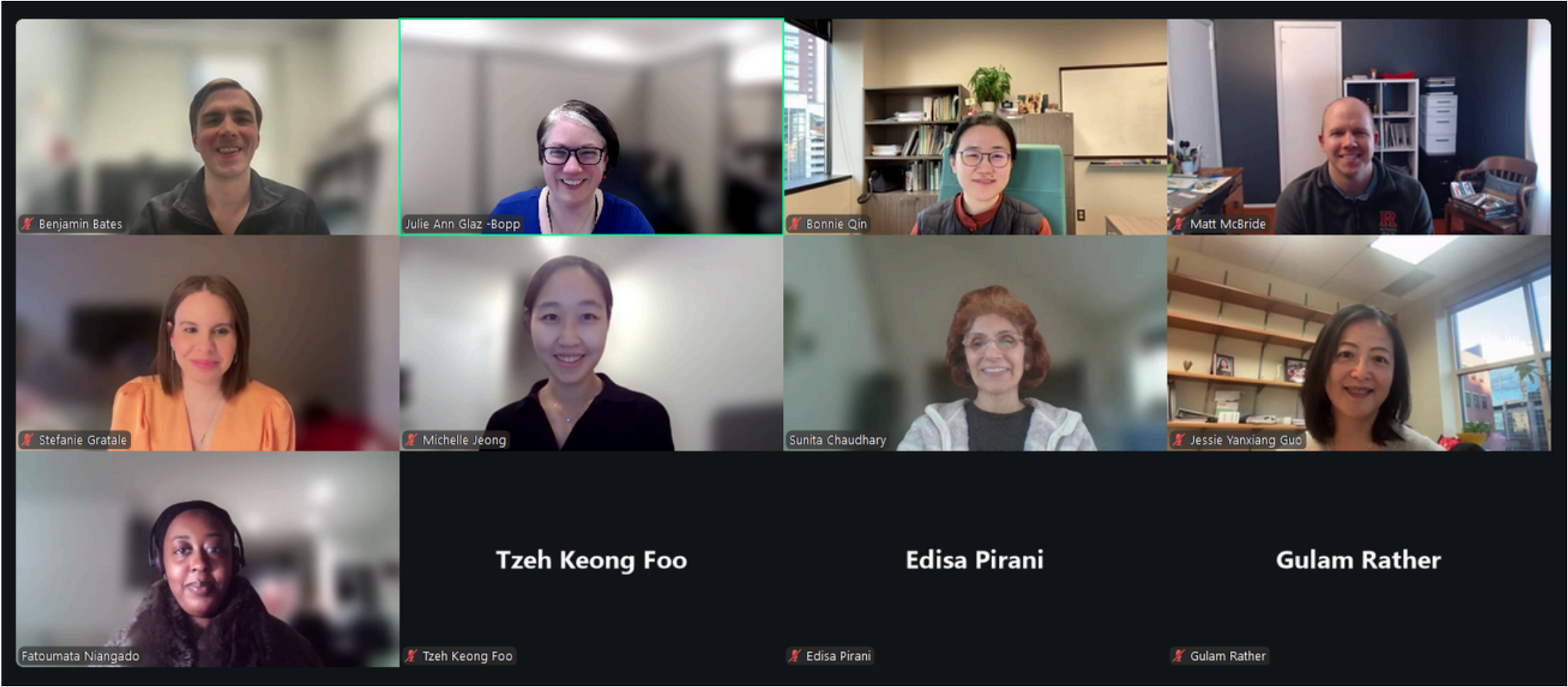

The discussion provided scholars with valuable perspective on career planning, professional growth, and the realities of academic advancement, leaving attendees feeling informed, supported, and empowered as they consider their next steps.

SEA Spotlight: December & January

Join us in celebrating our December and January SEA Spotlight scholars and the incredible work they are doing across research, leadership, and service.



Caitlin Weiger, PhD, is a social and behavioral scientist using neuroimaging, eye-tracking, and other psychophysiological measures to complement traditional survey research and interview methods to deepen our understanding of how people process health communication. Her work has largely focused on tobacco-related beliefs and perceptions, tobacco marketing, tobacco prevention communication, and relative harm communication. Caitlin was awarded a K99/R00 to develop and test messaging about the relative risk of e-cigarettes compared to cigarettes among adults who smoke using a multimethod approach, including neuroimaging.



Samuel Tundelialao is a Rutgers Presidential Fellow and Epidemiology PhD candidate at the Rutgers School of Public Health. His research interest focuses on addressing cancer disparities among marginalized populations such as ethnic minorities, immigrants, adolescents, young adults, and sexual and gender minority groups. Sam’s dissertation, funded by the New Jersey Commission on Cancer Research, investigates the genomic and epigenetic changes associated with fatigue among older male cancer survivors.

SEA Travel Awards

SEA offers travel grants of up to \$2,000 per year to support trainees who are presenting research at professional conferences with funds available to cover registration, travel, and hotel expenses.

Eligibility

- Demonstrated interest in a career in biomedical research
- U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident (LPR/green card holder)
- Actively presenting (poster or oral) at a professional conference
- Mentor is a member of Rutgers Cancer Institute
- Participation in community outreach or professional development at Rutgers Cancer Institute (e.g., peer mentoring, trainee seminar attendance)
